

Growing Disciples Who Grow Disciples

Guidelines

A Life Group needs to be a place where people feel comfortable opening up and sharing with one another. Guidelines give boundaries for people to operate within, help with the flow and pace of the discussions, help us to value one another, and help people to be more comfortable sharing deep and meaningful things.

CONFIDENTIALITY: Keeping things that are shared in the group confidential builds trust and shows value to the person. What is said in the group stays in the group.

LISTEN: Let's value one another during the discussions by really listening to what is being shared. Try to avoid thinking about how you are going to respond or what you are going to say next.

PAUSE: Allow a pause in conversation after someone shares. Give the person sharing the chance to finish and the group the opportunity to consider what was just shared before responding. Silence in the group provides an opportunity for someone to share and for members in the group to process the topic or question being considered.

AVOID "CROSS TALK": Be considerate of others as they are sharing – no side conversations.

AVOID RESCUING: When people are sharing something deeply personal, there can be a tendency to try to make them feel better about their situation by providing immediate condolences. This will often cause them to stop sharing. Resist the temptation to rescue people.

AVOID FIXING: Try to hear what people are sharing without trying to fix them. If they want your advice, they will ask for it. You may want to take time later to ask if you may share some advice.

SHARING: Be sensitive about the amount of time you share.

BE SELF-AWARE: Be self-aware of how you are personally affecting the environment through your words, actions, and non-verbal communication.

<u>"I" STATEMENTS:</u> During the discussion, we want to hear your personal thoughts and perspectives. Using "I" statements to answer discussion questions allows you to speak for yourself rather than generalizing by using such terms as "you", "they", "them", "the church", "us", or "we".

FIGHT FOR RELATIONSHIP: Relationships reach a whole new level when conflict is resolved in a healthy manner. When conflict or sin issues arise between group members, commit to fight for the relationship and discuss the struggle with the person you are in conflict with or seek wise advice.

DISCUSS THE EMPTY CHAIR: While one purpose of the group is to grow in our relationship with God through relationship with one another, the other purpose is to invite new people into relational discipleship. Remind one another of the importance of inviting new people into the group with the goal of "branching" into two groups. Biblical discipleship has both an inward and an outward focus. Like the first century church, a healthy group is constantly inviting new people to "come and see".

Meeting Outline – 1 hour 30 minutes

<u>WELCOME AND INTRODUCTIONS</u> (10 minutes) - At your first meeting, allow enough time for everyone to introduce themselves. (This makes everyone feel valued and welcomed. A warm welcome establishes a foundation for relationships, makes everyone aware of what is going on, and brings focus to the group.)

<u>OPENING PRAYER</u> (3 minutes) - Invite God's Holy Spirit into your presence. (This prepares your hearts for what God has for you and shifts your attention from individual fellowship to the group.)

<u>PURPOSE</u> (1 minute) – Review the purpose for our gathering – "to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ as we grow in deeper relationships with one another". (This helps prepare your hearts and minds for the discussion.)

<u>GUIDELINES</u> (2-5 minutes) – At the first meeting, read through the Life Group Guidelines line by line. At future meetings, briefly review the guidelines. (This provides Biblical guidance for healthy conflict resolution while establishing a safe environment where everyone can share openly and honestly.)

<u>WARM-UP</u> (10 minutes) – Read a brief section from the book and ask a related, "soft" question to the group so that personal experiences can be shared. (This activity sets the stage for transparency and trust and helps create a safe environment.)

<u>TELL THE STORY</u> (10 minutes) – Have your designated storyteller paraphrase the Scripture reading as best they can. Remember to start with, "Here's the story from God's Word." Try to refrain from teaching; just tell the story. The objective is not to memorize the story, but to learn it and be able to just share it. Remember to end with, "And that's the story from God's Word."

<u>READ THE SCRIPTURE</u> (5 minutes) – Have someone else in the group read the Scripture passage from the Bible.

<u>GROUP DISCUSSION</u> (20 minutes) – Ask a few questions in order to facilitate group discussion. (You will not be able to discuss every question; allow the quality and length of the discussion dictate how many questions get covered.)

<u>FAITH IN ACTION</u> (10 minutes) – Choose a few "faith in action" questions to discuss as a group. (These questions help lock the Scripture in group member's minds and hearts. They are designed to bring a clearer belief about who God really is, who they really are as His people, how they should see the world, and ultimately what we should change in our lives as a result. You can also paraphrase what happened in your group's discussion and you may even choose to issue a challenge for your group.)

<u>ASSIGN NEXT STORYTELLER</u> (2 minutes) – Determine who will be responsible for telling the story at your next group meeting.

<u>CLOSING PRAYER</u> (10 minutes) - Refocus your attention on God and His provision. (This is the time for personal prayer requests, group needs, and to praise God.)

Storytelling

PREPARE TO TELL THE STORY

- 1. <u>Pray</u> that the Holy Spirit would illuminate His truth in your understanding of the Scriptural passage.
- 2. Read the story from Scripture.
- 3. <u>Mirror Time</u>: Tell the story aloud as if you were telling your small group.
- 4. Take notes of each main point you make.
- 5. <u>Review your notes</u> against the Scriptural story and make adjustments in your notes.
- 6. <u>Be prepared</u> to tell the story without looking at your Bible or notes. If possible, tell the story to others.
- 7. <u>Avoid use of commentaries</u>. Allow the Holy Spirit to reveal God's Truth before you look at other resources.

TELL THE STORY

- 1. <u>Before you tell the story</u>, hold the Bible open and say, "Here's the story from God's Word." (As you are telling the story, try not to refer to it, but holding it open clearly conveys where the story originates.)
- 2. <u>Trust God's Word</u>. Trust that the stories told in the Bible are best told as God wrote them.
- 3. <u>If you see a specific emotion</u> used in the story, try to tell it with the appropriate emotion. Conversely, if there is not an emotion connected to the story, do not add one. This will either help convey the story more accurately or detract from its meaning.
- 4. A great way to remember a story and tell it with more passion is to <u>put yourself in the position of one of the characters.</u> Go back in time and see yourself in the scene, and your memory will be aided come story time.
- 5. <u>After you have told the story</u>, end with these words, "And that's the story from God's Word."

Life Groups are the primary method for us to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ. When Jesus first launched His ministry, He didn't begin with a big crowd; He began His ministry with a handful of ordinary, often-faithless people. As they were going about their daily lives (fishing!), "Jesus called out to them, 'Come, follow me, and I will show you how to fish for people!'" – Matthew 4:19

Head (To Know)

"Come, follow me" – A disciple follows Jesus. To be His disciples, we must recognize and accept who Jesus is, and place our lives under His authority. Even as we have questions, He leads and we obediently follow His teachings. Therefore, we study and invite God's Word to penetrate deep into our thoughts.

Heart (To Grow)

"and I will show you" – A disciple is being changed by Jesus. God loves us just the way we are, but He loves us too much to leave us there. Jesus grew the disciples through His teachings (beliefs), yet the real work of life transformation happened through their change of hearts in authentic, transparent community. Therefore, we allow the Holy Spirit to transform our hearts through relationships rooted in Christian faith.

Hands (To Invite)

"how to fish for people" – A disciple is committed to the mission of Jesus. When we grow in Christ, we can't help but care about what Jesus cares about... people. While Jesus cares about you and the people in your group, He also cares about those who are far from Him. Jesus created the church – you and me – as the primary way to reach those people through relational connections. Therefore, we create space for new people to experience Jesus through our Life Group... and we invite them to sit in the empty chair.
